



Old News Files List Games and Scores 1936 Football Season, The Eagles That Year Fared As Did the Eagles of 1962

If you are a loyal Bellevue basketball fan, you will spend approximately fifty nights this year, and the early part of next, sitting in gyms yelling for the Eagles. Whether you are player, coach or fan, to stick with basketball through that many games should prove you really love the sport. But think back for a moment to the first of September, when Football fever was running high as Bellevue was about to embark on it's first such venture since 1936.

At that time we printed the picture of the 1936 football team. Through the kind help of many citizens, we secured the name of each player except one. Also, there were discussions around town about how many games the 1936 team won, who their opponents were, and so on. At that time I did not know the exact location of the News files of that year, but this week I found them. From reading them, I decided the following information concerning the 1936 football season. Better late than never they tell me.

The first game of that season, some 27 years ago, was played September 25, Friday, at 3:00 in the afternoon with Bridgeport. Lewis Hodge of Bellevue was umpire. The Eagles lost by a score of 18-0.

Jacksboro was the scene of the tussle October 2, where the Tigers had little trouble winning, 40-2.

On October 9, it was Bellevue at Bowie with the Eagles on the short end again, 65-0.

The next week the Football Queen was to be crowned, and the following ten cuties were nominees for that honor: Elbert Ree Anderson, Helen Berry, Lucille Craft, Louise Flinn, Lerabelle Gaines, Jo Anita Grubbs, Francis Harbison, Marjorie Lankford, Rosemary Parrish, and Sarah Lee Martin. Seems the lucky girl had to have more votes than any of the others, at the rate of 5 votes for a penny. To make a long story short, Lucille Craft was elected. The Eagles lost the game that day also, to Jaint Jo, 48-0.

On November 6 it was the same old story, as the Nocona Indians took the Eagles 59.0 in a game played at Nocona.

On November 13 at Decatur, it was Decatur 92-0.

On October 16 the Eagles played Henrietta here, and WON the ball game. We do not have the score as the News for that week had no football writeup. The last paragraph of the story after the final game against Henrietta said, "This was the last game of the season and although they won only one game, the Eagles always played clean, hard football, and the best they could give."

Edgar Stephens and Edene Parsons were also members of the/1936 team along with those named with the picture we printed some weeks ago.

TO SCREWWORM PROGRAM

Clay County livestock producers have contributed \$11,453,50 the Southwest Screwworm Eradication Program, it was announced by Bill Hodges of Bellevue, chairman of the Clay County Chapter of the Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation.

he funds were cont ibuted by 226 individuals and firms, Hodges said.

Officials of the foundation have announced that they believe suf-

ficient funds will be available to continue the eradication proiect when current drives are completed.

The announcement that the remaining \$1 million of the \$2 million goal of the foundation has been collected means sufficient funds will be available to continue the project until Sept. 1, 1963.

Participation of the state through the Tex-Animal Health Commission, and the US Department of Agriculture is expected to complete the eradication, officials of the foundation announced.

Officials said that only ten screwworm cases were reported in February, 1963, as compared to 113 detected during the same period in 1962.

Dr. Richardson stressed quality during the morning session in connection with testing demonstrated by O. J. Mc-Adams of Henrietta, fieldman for the North Texas Milk Producers Association.

"Milk is the nation's most nearly perfect food--let's keep it that way," Dr. Richardson said.

The clinic was planned by the Clay County Dairy Sub-committee of the Extension Program Building Committee under the chairmanship of A. R. Liggett of Vashti.

Other members of the committee are McAdams, W. C. Johnston of Petrolia, W. E. Reichert of Dean, Hershel Studdard of Bellevue, Ed Conrady of Windthorst, Jerome Spivey of Joy and Raymond Gill of Bellevue.

DAIRY SHORT COURSE TO BE HELD SEPTEMBER 23-26

A dairy short course for adult farmers will be held September 23-26 under the sponsorship of the Bellevue and Bowie High Vocation Agriculture Departments according to Mr. Coy Keahey, Superintendent and Mr. H. K. Lowrance, teacher of Vocational Agriculture.

Mr. Joe Hillin, Dairy Specialist with the Vocational Agriculture of the Texas Education Agency and the Department of Dairy Science at Texas A & M College, will be the instructor for the course. He is headquartered at Texas A & M College.

Mr. Hillin holds a B.S. degree in Dairy Husbandry and an M.S. in Dairy Science. He has served as a teaching assistant in Dairy and with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service in the Dairy Extension Service was with production testing and dairy herd

management,

"Many dairy short courses in various parts of the state have been taught by Mr. Hillin and all have met with outstanding success," according to J. B. Payne, Area Supervisor of Vocational Agriculture, Stephenville, Texas. Arrangements for the adult education short course in dairying and in other fields are made through Mr. J.B. Payne's office.

The short course at Bellevue and Bowie is scheduled to begin September 23, 1963 at 8:00 p.m. in the vocational agriculture building at Bowie. Other meetings in the series will be held at the place the group wants them on September 24, 25 and 25 the dates the short is in progress, Mr. Hillin will be available to assist dairymen with individual problems and to provide on-the-

farm instruction according to H. K. Lowrance and Kenneth Schack-ford

Dairymen interested in attending the short course should write or call the Superintendent of Schools, Mr. Coy Keahey, or the teacher of Vocational Agriculture, Mr. H. K. Lowrance. An entry fee of \$2.00 will be charged. Dairy Short Course Certificates are to be presented to each dairyman who attends all the training sessions.

Mr. Hillin states that the short course will be adjusted to wishes and interests of dairymen enrolled but that he expects to cover such subjects as developing a good dairy herd, raising cows and heifers, feeding for milk production, making and feeding silage, methods of using milking machines, general management problems, and dairy equipment.

"Short courses in dairying, as well as in other areas, are now available to farmers throughout the state under the new cooperative program between the Texas Education Agency and Texas A& M College," stated Bob Jasks, Associate Professor, Department of Agricultural Education at Texas A& M College, who coordinates the program for Texas A& M.

"This cooperative program," states Jasks, "is designed to make the services of specialists available to conduct short courses under the supervision of public schools. Such a program will enable teachers of vocational agriculture to provide improved educational services to farm people."

Specialists are now available in the fields of beef cattle, insect control, farm management, farm electrification, farm welding, swine production, tractor maintenance, dairy science, pasture and oxy-acetylene welding.




